The meeting called to order at 7:04pm, by Mitchell Glenn who presided in the absences (due to family illnesses) of the Chair and Assistant Chair.

1. Report on Highbridge Park Anchor Project visioning session: Mitchell Glenn reported that roughly 120 people attended (in addition to Parks staff and electeds' reps). The group was divided into 12-14 tables, each with map of the park as well as a facilitator and a note-take. For a half hour each group discussed what they envisioned and saw as necessary improvements for park. Each table then reported back to the full group the highlights of the conversation. Main concerns for park were: bathrooms; improving connectivity of between the northern and southern sections of the park; more access points and more inviting entryways; repair paths, stairs, lighting; installing water fountains; better signage and maps; more benches; more exercise equipment or park furniture for outdoor exercise; a soccer field; more concessions; improving access to natural areas/trails. There also were more fanciful suggestions, such as a zip line.

Northern Manhattan Parks Administrator Jennifer Hoppa added that it was thrilling to hear impassioned, unique ideas, such as building a soccer field, ice skating rink and concessions/refreshments area, as well as ideas that echoed from table to table. Now the landscape architects are tasked with trying to accommodate as many of these suggestions as possible, within the footprint of the park and the project budget, in the proposed design. Other proposals, such as improving maintenance and security, and increased publicity for public programming, will have to be addressed separately since they are outside the scope of a capital project. We'll be inviting you to see and comment on design concept plans at a Community Report Back Meeting in early 2017. Please watch for this announcement in the coming months. - 2. Dyckman Green Gym: Leatt Beder & George Bloomer, NYC Parks, presented an updated design based on feedback from the November meeting and ongoing discussion with the BarStarzz. The gym is now a multi-structure apparatus with five ADA accessible structures. The gym has been expanded by 300 square feet; the overall size is 2800 square feet. BarStarzz raised objections that the design had a triangular apparatus (which they don't want), and lacked toe bars which could not be incorporated to due safety and size constraints. Also they would like a 5-foot (not 4-foot) bar for certain exercise routines. The Committee would like for Barstarzz and NYC Parks to be in agreement on these points before approving the proposed design. BarStarzz will meet with park design team to plan modifications. Construction possible in Fall 2017 depending on timeline of remaining approval process. The project will be bundled with other parks projects to ensure a \$1million bonded contractor. [Note: subsequent to the meeting, Barstarzz met with NYC Parks designers who were able to get approval from the equipment manufacturer to modify the bar to 5'. A resolution in support of the amended design therefore is included as part of the work product of this meeting.]
- 3. Audubon Playground Update: Jennifer Hoppa reported that \$7.7 million available for complete overhaul. The temporary structure will be demolished. ADA compliant bathrooms will be installed. Seventy-eighty people came to the public scoping session and commented through the portal. A schematic design will be presented to the Committee in Spring 2017.
- 4. Inwood Nature Center Rehabilitation: Rebecca Byrnes, Ricardo Hinkle, & Alex Kozar, NYC Parks architects presented the proposed design. The new design is ADA compliant and accessible, more flood resistant, with mechanical structures to be installed on roof and shielded from view by wood screening. Site entrance is improved by moving to center. Exhibits will be restored, although public has questions about programmatic quality and content. \$2.5 million funding is from FEMA, the Mayor, and Councilman Ydanis Rodriguez.

The plan is finished, but initial landscape restoration will be incomplete: site circulation, paved area will be done immediately; Native America interpretive garden, resilient habitat restoration and the rest of plan needs \$500,000 additional funding. Security for center is the current roll-down gates.

Members of the public raised concerns about the programmatic plans for the Nature Center and how these will be incorporated into the interior design. There were additional concerns that the rehabilitation of the external building not limit enhancements and updates to the interior structure (within existing funding constraints). NYC Parks will revisit the interior design in consultation with the community (including users and experts) to provide improved and updated programs and activities for the community.

A resolution in support of NYC Parks proposed renovation plan with the aforementioned recommendations was unanimously approved by the Committee (6 votes in favor); the public vote was also in favor (9-1-0-2).

5. Parks Department Update from Jennifer Hoppa:

The Highbridge Water Tower is a separately funded project proposed to be completed in two
phases. The initial phase is funded and is in final design. A construction contractor will be sought
in 2017. This project will open the tower to the public after making necessary repairs and safety

improvements, including to the windows, roof, and stairs. The unfunded Phase II project would include work unrelated to the building opening but important for the long life of the building, such as painting. It would include a new permanent wheelchair ramp. Parks also would like to make a long-standing community request happen: the installation of electronic, programmable bells in the tower to replace the original carillon installed in 1958 and destroyed in 1985.

Community Board 12, Manhattan Parks & Cultural Affairs Committee Resolution Supporting the Proposed Design of an Outdoor Fitness Area in Inwood Hill Park December 6, 2016

Whereas: Councilmember Ydanis Rodriguez initially approved \$100k for an outdoor fitness area on Dyckman Street in Inwood Hill Park, with the NYC Department of Parks & Recreation (NYC Parks) to design and build such a facility within the allocated budget; and

Whereas: a public scoping meeting was held on January 22, 2016, and based on feedback of the facilities' users it became clear that the initial allocation would be insufficient and NYC Parks procured an additional \$150k from the Councilmember, for a total of \$250k; and

Whereas: a presentation was made by NYC Parks architects at the November 1, 2016 meeting of the Community Board 12, Manhattan Parks & Cultural Affairs (PCA) Committee for such a plan, but members of the community and other users of the facility, including representatives of BarStarzz from both within and outside of the community, had concerns regarding the equipment manufacturer and also wished to see significant modifications of the proposed facility; and

Whereas: NYC Parks, a New York City agency, is constrained by NYC procurement regulations and the City's VENDEX process, but was able to work with a manufacturer to get design modifications in the equipment being used for the proposed project; and

Whereas: NYC Parks made a presentation at the December 6, 2016 meeting of the PCA Committee which incorporated significant modifications in scope, size, and design based on both feedback from the November meeting and subsequent input of the BarStarzz; and

Whereas: the BarStarzz desired an additional design modification which the NYC Parks was able to get a manufacturer to make in the proposed equipment; now, therefore be it

Resolved: that Community Board 12, Manhattan supports the proposed design presented by NYC Parks at the December 6, 2016 Parks & Cultural Affairs Committee meeting, as subsequently amended (i.e., that the equipment have a 5' bar rather than a 4' bar); and be it further

Resolved: that Community Board 12, Manhattan urges the Public Design Commission to support this project when it comes before the Commission for approval.
