



Parkland Alienation: An Alarming Trend



Parkland is a precious commodity and is sheltered by the **Public Trust Doctrine** – whose theory is to afford the greatest legal protection to parks, or land held in the public's trust.

Alienation is the taking of public parkland for non-park purposes. The courts have decided on a case-by-case basis what constitutes "non-park purpose."

"Parkland is impressed by a public trust, requiring legislative approval before it can be alienated or used for an extended period of time for non-park purposes." *Friends of Van Cortlandt Park, et al. v. New York City*

How Does Alienation Occur?

Requires the approval of both the City and State

- 1. ULURP
- 2. City Council resolution asking State for special legislation to alienate
- 3. State Legislature
- 4. Alienation

To comply with SEQRA, a **full** environmental review, including public hearings, must be conducted **prior** to the New York City Council's passage of a home rule resolution to request alienation authority from the State Legislature.

Recent Examples of Alienation

Van Cortlandt Park

• seminal, complicated case

• set legal precedent: whenever parkland is taken for nonpark purposes State Legislative approval needed.

Yankee Stadium

The proposals should have gone through the City's ULURP procedure, with hearings before the CBs, City Planning and the City Council.

Mercer Playground



In 1995 the Department of Transportation gave Parks a permit to use the site. Two years later the site was formally transferred to Parks, and plans were made for capital improvements." Department of Parks & Recreation
