**Re: Dog Waste** 

Dear Councilmember Bottcher & Commissioner Grayson,

Manhattan Community Board 4 (MCB4) requests the Department of Sanitation explore a renewed campaign encouraging City residents to clean up after their dogs. There has been an observed increase of dog waste on our streets and sidewalks contributing to the dirtiness of our public spaces.

At its March 2<sup>nd</sup> Full Board meeting by a vote of 40 in favor, 0 against, 0 abstentions and 0 present but not eligible, MCB4 votes in favor of action to curb this objectionable behavior.

Our streets and sidewalks are dirtier, and the dog feces pedestrians have to navigate is an added element having deleterious effects on our health and well-being. We request enforcement of New York State Public Health Law §1310<sup>1</sup> requiring anyone in custody or control of a dog to remove any feces left by his or her dog on any sidewalk, gutter, street, or other public area.

We also request DSNY and Councilmember Bottcher explore a meaningful public ad campaign educating the public on the responsibility of dog ownership, in this regard. We suggest including local artists and groups to produce inventive ways to broadcast the message to clean up after your dog, which have been effective in other locales.<sup>2</sup>

With over 500,000 dogs in NYC pre-pandemic and dog ownership growing exponentially during COVID, our dog waste problem has grown with it. Knowing Councilmember Bottcher's interest in advocating for a healthier sanitation program, we recommend a "scoop the poop" campaign be included.
