Meeting Date / Location	The Full Board met at 6:30pm on Wednesday, June 1, 2022, via Zoom webinar and was simultaneously live streamed on YouTube. It can be viewed at: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ctEtUBLFNwU
Public Hearing	Public Hearing: Uniform Land Use Review Procedure (ULURP) Application for Affordable Housing Site – 705 10th Avenue (DEP Site). Clinton/Hell’s Kitchen Land Use Co-Chair JD Noland opened the hearing.
Public Hearing Speakers	
Lori Klinger	Ms. Klinger is the Artistic and Executive Director of Rosie’s Theater Kids, an arts education organization dedicated to enriching the lives of children through the arts. The group was founded around the Theater District at PS51 in 2003. 86% of the students served by the organization are from low-income households; the need for housing for these families within the district is critical. The group has also observed the loss of art spaces in the district so is thrilled that the community facility tenant at the proposed site is IndieSpace. Rosie’s Theater Kids supports the project and the benefits it will bring to the community.
Rachel Berger-Rosas	Ms. Berger-Rosas is the Founder and Executive Director of the Artists Co-Op, an organization with the mission of creating a thriving artist community. In 2017, Ms. Berger-Rosas founded the first artist coworking space in Hell’s Kitchen. The organization now serves over 175 artists and has hosted over 100 events. In 2020, the Artists Co-Op needed to close their space due to COVID but is excited to open again at IndieSpace. The artists served by the Co-Op are primarily low- and moderate-income, who need affordable places to live and work. The organization is excited to share the space with affordable housing and sees opportunities to engage with the building’s tenants and the park space.
Joe Petrucelli	Mr. Petrucelli is the Executive Director of the Jazz Foundation of America, a nonprofit that supports musicians and their families through services including housing assistance, pro bono healthcare, disaster relief, and direct financial support. The group operates nationally but is headquartered in our neighborhood. Many of the organization’s clients live in precarious financial situations, exacerbated by the pandemic. Mr. Petrucelli asserts these artists’ right to safe and secure housing within this community, as well as affordable cultural spaces to rehearse and perform. He looks forward to partnering on programming at the new proposed site and bringing free concerts to the neighborhood.
Paul Leibowitz	Mr. Leibowitz is one of the Founders of IndieSpace and is currently one of the organization’s Co-Chairs. He is excited for IndieSpace to lease the community facility space at 705 10 th Avenue, which brings together critical affordable housing, much-needed open space, and affordable ground floor art space. One of the missions of Indispace is to create affordable performance and rehearsal spaces for the artist community, which is particularly important as many organizations have been displaced during the pandemic. Mr. Leibowitz

	looks forward to operating a long-term affordable workspace for artists and engaging with tenants in the building and the adjacent open space.
Becca Gottlieb	Ms. Gottlieb is an artist who works freelance in musical theater and is excited about the DEP Site project. She currently lives on 52 nd Street and 11 th Avenue. Ms. Gottlieb is grateful to the Actor’s Fund for helping her to find affordable housing and providing guidance through the housing process. She asserts that housing for people within the low- to moderate-income brackets is important to help artists, many of whom are freelancers.
Public Hearing	Public Hearing: Manhattan Community Board 4 (MCB4) Hybrid Meeting Policy. Chair Jeffrey LeFrancois opened the hearing. There were no speakers for this public hearing.

Public Session Speakers	
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Anna Koskol	Ms. Koskol is the Manager of Environmental Education at Hudson River Park. The Park is back with a full slate of in-person programs, including a summer camp starting on July 5 and the opening of the Wetlab research aquarium on Pier 40. Healthy on the Hudson has also begun with yoga and HIIT training. Sunset on the Hudson has begun on Pier 45, with eclectic music performances, and the Dance Music Festival is upcoming on June 9 and 10. The Blues BBQ Festival will be held on August 13 on Pier 76 and the Submerge Marine Science Festival on October 14-15. A full listing of events can be found at www.hudsonriverpark.org/events . The Park is also celebrating the third anniversary of the “Park over Plastics” program by publishing a free guide for other parks and businesses to help reduce plastics usage. The guide is available on the Park’s website.
Lisa Wager	Ms. Wager is the Director of Government and Community Relations at the Fashion Institute of Technology (FIT). FIT recently held its 77 th Commencement Ceremonies, with Bachelor’s and Associate degrees awarded in 31 programs, and graduate degrees in 7 programs. FIT’s Center for Continuing and Professional Studies is offering summer courses, which start throughout the summer, and each run for 3-8 weeks. Courses include fashion styling, sustainable marketing, woodworking, personal branding and more. The FIT Museum has opened a new exhibition featuring Dior and Balenciaga- the first exhibition to juxtapose these designers side-by-side. Remarks from Elected Officials and Representatives	
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State Senator Brad Hoylman	<p>State Senator Hoylman shared the following updates:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Speed cameras: pleased to announce that a bill was passed to make speed cameras in school zones operate 24/7 • Tourist helicopters: Dick Gottfried and I passed a bill that will create a cause of action of nuisance for people who are impacted by the noise of tourist helicopters. On a related note, there should be no helipad in Hudson River Park. • Gun safety: legislation was passed today that will require microstamping on all new handguns, which will create a way to identify gun owners from shell casings. The Senator also proposed a law that bans large magazines. He also supports expanding red flag laws and banning Kevlar body armor.
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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Adult survivors of sexual abuse: he supports legislation which will allow adult survivors of sexual abuse to file claims retroactively. The Senator said the statute of limitations was way too short previously, and was expanded a few years ago. This new legislation will allow adult survivors to file the claims retroactively. • Mental health: an archaic federal law prohibits Medicaid reimbursement for psychiatric care in hospitals with more than 15 patients. I have introduced legislation that will require programs to seek a Medicaid waiver, which has already worked in several states. • HIV: the Senator introduced legislation today requiring insurance carriers to cover the costs of post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) and HIV-prevention drugs (PrEP).
<p>Betsy Schmid for Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney</p>	<p>Ms. Schmid provided the following updates: Congresswoman Maloney introduced the Stealthing Act and Consent is Key Act to protect victims of non-consensual condom removal (also known as “stealthing:”). The Congresswoman is also committed to protecting reproductive rights. She also introduced 7 gun safety bills this legislative session, more than any other member of Congress. She also introduced the Michelle Alyssa Go Act which will allow medical facilities with more than 16 beds to be reimbursed by Medicaid. It also requires facilities to meet nationally recognized, evidence-based standards for mental health or substance use disorder programs.</p>
<p>Tyler Reynolds for Assemblymember Linda Rosenthal</p>	<p>Assemblymember Rosenthal is a staunch proponent of the ban on “ghost guns” that was passed recently. The ever-popular “Shred Day” will be back on June 12 from 10 am until 2 pm. COVID rates are still far too large – please let the office know if you need masks or COVID tests.</p>
<p>Eric Strazza for District Attorney Alvin Bragg</p>	<p>The District Attorney’s office is co-hosting a Gun Buy-Back program on Saturday, June 25 to allow community members to anonymously surrender any guns in exchange for a gift card (value TBD based on the quantity/type of gun). DA Bragg’s office helped to create the Manhattan Small Business Alliance to respond to the needs of small business owners. Just last month, the Mid-Manhattan Focus Group met for the first time. There has been an increase in hate crimes in Manhattan so we are expanding our team that addresses hate crimes. We also have a Hate Crimes Hotline (212-335-3100).</p>
<p>Councilmember Gale Brewer</p>	<p>Negotiations are ongoing regarding the City’s budget, but it looks promising that there will be money to expand sanitation services, which is a top priority. Non-essential helicopters continue to be a problem for Manhattan residents. This past weekend, there were more than 300 complaints about non-essential helicopters that were reported to 311. Councilmember Brewer continues to support the idea of converting empty hotels to permanent supportive housing, and encourages everyone to voice their support for this proposal.</p>

<p>Manhattan Borough President Mark Levine</p>	<p>MBP Levine is very excited to welcome MCB4’s newest members: Aurora Cruz, Matt Green, Yadira Jimenez, Charlie Todd and Carl Wilson. He also thanked the outgoing members for their years of service: Sara Appleton, Elzora Cleveland, Thuy Pham, Rob Walker and Colin Wright. He said that more than 900 people applied for 300 community board seats, so it was a very competitive pool of applicants.</p> <p>Regarding issues around the Open Meetings Law, MBP Levine’s office is deeply engaged in trying to arrange support for each community board for hybrid meetings and to meet the needs of each community board.</p> <p>Levine’s office is working with Bottcher’s office to address the rat infestation. In high rat areas, they are trying to require rat mitigation plans.</p> <p>Levine’s office also pushed to have control of street cameras returned to City control.</p> <p>There is about \$2 million available in zero-interest loans to small business owners in Manhattan who have suffered financial hardship during the pandemic, so please reach out to his office if you are a small business owner interested in a zero-interest loan.</p>
