Re: Family with children HERC (Humanitarian Emergency Resource Center) at the Watson Hotel – 440 West 57 Street.

Dear President Katz,

On February 16th, 2022, the NYC Health and Hospitals Corporation (HHC) presented the use of the Watson Hotel at 440 West 57th Street, for a HERC, a shelter for asylum seekers with children to Manhattan Community Board 4's (MCB4) Housing, Health, & Human Services Committee. Committee members reviewed and discussed the HHC program at the and the community concerns at the public meeting. MCB4 applauds HHC's continued outreach to the local community and attempts to resolve concerns and issues and recommends applying HHC's program model to other DHS shelters in Manhattan Community District 4 (MCD4).

At its regularly scheduled Full Board meeting on March 1st, 2023, MCB4 voted 36 in favor, 0 opposed, 0 abstaining, and 0 present but not eligible to vote to request that the NYC HHC continue to engage with MCB4 on issues surrounding the temporary shelter for asylum seekers at the Watson Hotel and respond to the community's requests and questions summarized below.

Background

There are currently a total of six HERC shelter sites for asylum seekers in or adjacent to MCD4, with approximately 2,143 beds (in MCD4: Watson Hotel, 440 West 57th Street; Skyline Hotel, 725 10th Ave; Washington Jefferson Hotel, 318 West 51st Street; Econo Lodge, 300 West 47th Street; and Artel Hotel, 305 West 39th Street; in MCD5: Row Hotel, 700 8th Ave; Paramount Hotel, 235 West 46th Street; and Stewart Hotel, 371 7th Avenue and see Appendix for map).

When the Watson Hotel was first opened by HHC in November 2022, it exclusively housed single adult male asylum seekers. The Watson Hotel has 600 rooms for families with children, with around 250 occupied for a total of approximately 870 occupants as of February 16th, 2023. At minimum, each room will house an adult and a child under the age of 18. Therefore, the population is expected to increase to 1,200 persons.

Before moving the occupants into the Watson Hotel, HHC conducts room maintenance checks, makes bed arrangements to suit family size and provides basic supplies. Each family is given a room assignment, badge and QR code when they enter the Watson Hotel.

Access to diapers and baby formula is immediately provided. 24/7 clinical care is provided at the site, along with childhood vaccination teams to ensure vaccinations required to attend school. DOE enrollment staff are also present to enroll children to school. Most asylum seekers are eligible for emergency Medicaid; therefore, Metro Health has a station on-site for enrollment. Phase 2 of intake includes connection services to help the asylum seekers contact families and friends and be reticketed if needed.

Community Concerns & Requests

- Extend the use of the HHC vaccination clinic to occupants in DHS shelters in Hell's Kitchen as a resource to provide required vaccinations for school attendance.
- Accommodate and coordinate additional after school programs and English learning classes, and tutors with other City agencies.
- Create outdoor open spaces for children and explore programming to engage occupants in common areas.
- PS 33, PS 51, and PS 111 are at or nearly at capacity, averaging 33 students per class.
 The Board asks HHC to work with DOE to place asylum seeker in schools with available classroom capacity.

Community Questions

- How many case workers serve asylum seekers at The Watson?
- In the case that asylum seekers are without families or friends in the U.S., what are the plans for relocation and settlement?

Conclusion

MCB4 thanks HHC for their continued engagement with the community and asks HHC to respond to the community concerns and requests as raised by and in response to the opening of the Watson Hotel.

The bigger policy issue raised is how can the City of New York apply HHC's successful, well managed practices to DHS's shelter locations in MCD4?
