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#### **PUBLIC SESSION:**

First Vice Chair Hugh Weinberg called on the members of the public who signed up to speak. The public spoke on the following topics:

1. A representative of Commune spoke about the mobile app they are developing, which seeks to compile information about civic organizations and events to improve awareness. He stated that the app was close to a public launch and solicited volunteer testers.

2. A representative from the Lennox Hill HealthPlex stated that they had been open about six months and had seen 10,000 patients to date, including quite serious cases.

 3. A porter in a building on West 28th Street spoke of the efforts to organize and improve benefits for building workers in Chelsea and supported the proposed letter from CB4 on the subject. Chair Berthet noted that the relevant letter, Item 26, had been tabled until next month.

4. The regional director of the Department of Consumer Affairs spoke about that department's recent efforts, including the paid sick leave law, a small business reform package, and an upcoming phone-a-thon on January 31 for earned income tax credit awareness day -- tax credits not being claimed by many eligible for them.

5. Two individuals spoke in favor of the Meatpacking BID (Item 17), stating that such BIDs provide useful community services and thanking CB4 for working with the BID's steering committee.

6. One individual spoke on behalf of More Art, a not-for-profit seeking to promote public art for underserved communities.

7. A representative of Gutman Community College stated that she and her students in social work were on a field trip attending tonight's meeting.

8. A resident of West 22nd Street spoke of a traffic issue at the northeast corner of 11th Avenue and West 22nd Street, where a construction company, not presently doing any work, has closed off the street with no protective pedestrian walkway. Mr. Weinberg suggested that the resident speak to district manager Jesse Bodine about this issue.

9. A representative from 530 West 45th Street Development stated that a lottery had started today for two remaining affordable apartments. Chair Berthet stated that an e-blast had been sent to the CB4 e-mail list about the lottery.

# ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA AND THE MINUTES OF THE MAY 2014 FULL BOARD MEETING:

Chair Berthet stated that items 20, 24, 26, 27, and 28 were being tabled. Being added as new business are Item 29, a letter to the DCP regarding ULURP applications and Special West Chelsea expansion, and Item 30, on SantaCon. JD Noland requested that CB4 send a letter regarding recent efforts to de-calendar hundreds of buildings from the docket of the Landmarks Preservation Committee; that issue was added as Item 31. With those changes, the agenda was approved.

The Minutes of the November 2014 Full Board Meeting were adopted without amendment.

#### REPORTS OF ELECTED OFFICIALS:

**Diana Howard, for Borough President Gale Brewer,** stated that 2015 community board applications are now available on line and that current CB4 members up for re-appointment will be sent emails about reapplying. The deadline for applications is January 30. She noted that the Borough President also is concerned about the landmarks de-calendaring.

- 1 **Brad Hoylman, State Senator**, spoke about today's announcement regarding the grand jury in Staten
- 2 Island, stating that he hoped for calm and that his thoughts are with the victim's family. Senator
- 3 Hoylman is introducing legislation regarding terminally ill individuals who wish to end their own lives;
- 4 five states currently allow such choice. Noting the United Stated Postal Service's attempt to transfer air
- 5 rights above a local post office, he expressed his concern that the postal service attempted to do this
- without community outreach. Senator Hoylman noted that there is talk in Albany about a special session 6
- 7 to raise the pay of legislators and expressed his believe that a commission of experts should look at this
- 8 issue. He also described a recent positive court decision from the New York Court of Appeals regarding 9 the status of rent-stabilized leases in bankruptcy proceedings.

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Eli Szenes-Strauss, for Assemblymember Richard Gottfried, also spoke about the Staten Island grand jury, stating their thoughts were with the victim's family. He echoed the expressed concerns about the baffling landmarks de-calendaring proposal. There will be state-wide hearings this month on universal health care in New York; the Manhattan hearing will be on January 16.

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Erica Overton, for Assemblymember Linda Rosenthal, stated that the Assemblymember is deeply disappointed with the grand jury decision. She noted that the SLA was requiring the recent applicant Rise Bar to close at 2 a.m. nightly.

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Matthew Green, for Councilmember Corey Johnson, stated that Councilmember Johnson is outraged by the grand jury decision and sends his condolences to the victim's family. The city council passed its first bill to protect victims of domestic violence in the shelter system. Councilmember Johnson has introduced a bill seeking to modernize the birth certificate process for transgender individuals.

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Shelby Garner, for Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney, reported on the congresswoman's efforts to establish a women's history museum, including a new social media campaign in support.

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29 30 Ed Sullivan, for Public Advocate Letitia James, stated that the public advocate is as angry as everyone else about the result in Staten Island. The public advocate is seeking to use the merger of Comcast and Time Warner as an opportunity to get interest access into NYCHA Housing.

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#### REPORT OF DISTRICT MANAGER JESSE BODINE:

Jesse Bodine stated that he was two weeks into his job as the new district manager for CB4. He is in the process of meeting with the chairs of each committee to understand how the office can best support the committees. He is also meeting with the police, local agencies, and block associations in the community. He thanked CB4 staffers Nelly Gonzalez and Erica Baptiste for their support during the transition process.

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#### **BUDGET AND JOBS TASK FORCE REPORT:**

On behalf of the Budget and Jobs Task Force, Burt Lazarin reported that CB4 has just finished its budget priorities. In February 2015, we will receive the preliminary budget for 2016 and will need to come up with our response. He noted that the task force is always looking for new members.

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1 BLP Committee Co-Chair Paul Seres asked the applicant on Item 5 if they would agree to remove a storm 2 enclosure not in compliance with city regulations, which the applicant had installed after their 3 appearance at the BLP meeting. The applicant agreed to remove the non-conforming storm enclosure. 4 5 6 Clinton/Hell's Kitchen Land Use Committee (C/HKLU) 7 8 Item 12: Letter to DCP re Special Permit and Zoning Text Amendment/505-513 West 43rd Street. 9 (APPROVED AS AMENDED) 10 C/HKLU Chair JD Noland stated that typos in the letter have been corrected and thanked Betty 11 Mackintosh for her good suggestions. 12 Ernest Modarelli expressed concern that we are giving up affordable condo units in exchange for a small 13 height reduction. Joe Restuccia stated that the letter needed to explain CB4's thinking more fully. This block was rezoned 14 15 several years ago to provide a transition zone between West 42nd Street and the Special Clinton District. 16 The committee did not want to completely disregard the maximum height of 135 feet set just five years 17 ago in the rezoning. 18 Maarten DeKadt stated that the timeline was not clear regarding when the affordable housing had to be 19 created. Mr. Restuccia stated that the letter will be clarified on that point. 20 21 By roll call vote, the letter was approved by 35 yes votes to 3 no votes. 22 23 At this point, the consideration of Committee Letters and Resolutions was interrupted to hear from Borough President Gale Brewer. 24 25 Borough President Gale Brewer thanked CB4 for all its work, especially in the area of affordable 26 housing. She stated that she was at city hall today when the Staten Island non-indictment was announced. All bill signings were cancelled. On other topics, she noted that there has been much discussion about 27 28 the new phone booths.
