July 2017 Full Board Meeting Minutes

PUBLIC HEARING	<p>Hudson Tunnel Project Daft Environmental Impact Statement.</p> <p>Betty Mackintosh, Co-Chair of the Chelsea Land Use Committee, opened the meeting with a request for comments from the public. There being no comments, the hearing was closed.</p>
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Public Session	
Pamela Wolff	Ms. Wolff spoke on behalf of the 200 West 20th Street Block Association about their concerns relating to the liquor license applications presented in Agenda Items 6 and 17. She asked the Board to be aware of the fact that there are already a number of establishments that serve liquor near the applicants' sites.
Frank Lowe	Mr. Lowe is member of the 18th & 19th Street 300 Block Association. He believes that landlords favor bars and restaurants over other businesses because those with liquor licenses are willing to pay higher rent. He also believes that the SLA's 500-foot rule is not being honored in most cases. He, too, is opposed to the applications referenced in Items 6 and 17.
Yaritza Mejia	Ms. Mejia is the Marketing and Events manager for the Hudson Yards / Hell's Kitchen Alliance, the BID that maintains and operates Hudson Boulevard Park between West 33rd and West 36th Streets. She spoke about some of the ongoing events that are held in the park: musical performances for children on Tuesday morning, the farmers market on Thursday (11 am – 6 pm), yoga instruction on Sunday mornings, and, boot camp on Monday from 7-8 am) Ms. Mejia announced the "Hate Has No Business Here" campaign, which is being promoted by 21 Business Improvement Districts across the city. Its purpose is to combat hateful speech that impacts small business communities.
Tina DiFeliciano	Tina is a Board member who spoke about a rat infestation at her building, which is located on West 26th Street between 6th and 7th Avenues. She said that this condition was caused by the developer of an adjoining building who tore up the sidewalk to install utilities. He was able to get a DOB permit for this work even though there was a full stop work order in place for his project. The sidewalk has not been restored and the rats continue to thrive in the uncovered space. Because the DOB has done nothing to remedy the problem for over a month, Tina is seeking the advice of CB4 on how to expedite a solution.
John Ritter	Mr. Ritter spoke on behalf of The Friends of Lab Middle School in support of Agenda Item 32 having to do with the street fair permit requested by the Lab School, located on West 17th Street between 8th and 9th Avenues. His daughter is a student of the school.
Mandisa Wright	Ms. Wright is with the Goren Group and produces events at The Women's Building, which occupies the building on 11th Avenue that was formerly the Bayview Correctional Facility. She produced the opening block party there last year and this year she is producing another

	in collaboration with the NoVo Foundation on September 23rd. Her hope is to hire up to fifty formerly-incarcerated women for a two-week period to promote the event. The block party features food, dancing and performers from the community. She asked those who are interested in performing their song, dance or spoken word routines to apply.
Italo Medelius	Italo is a member of the Board who spoke on behalf of the Hudson Guild Advisory Committee. He offered two petitions for signing that relate to the practices of two large supermarkets in the district. One seeks to have Gristedes restore its participation in the WIC Program, and the other to have Ideal Market restore its practice of accepting SNAP benefits for orders taken over the phone. There are a great number of homebound community residents who rely on SNAP having only the phone as a way to use them.
Jim Dingman	Mr. Dingman represents the WBAI Pacifica Local Station Board. WBAI is a commercial-free, listener-supported community radio station. Mr. Dingman will be speaking before every community board in the City to seek support for WBAI's struggle against the Empire State Building to reduce the transmission fees that it charges WBAI. Ever since 9/11, the ESB has been the only transmitter available to WBAI and, as a result, is forced to pay four times the market rate for its signal. Mr. Dingman wants CB4 to coordinate with elected officials and come up with a resolution to send to the ESB. He was advised by the Chair to consult with the District Manager about making a presentation at the appropriate CB4 committee.
George Karp	Mr. Karp spoke in opposition to the application of Tumboa covered in Agenda Item 2. He stated that there have been many changes at Tumboa since the time its application was considered by the BLP Committee and suggests that the application be sent back for reconsideration.
James Wallace	Mr. Wallace, who is a Board member, spoke about the You Tube channel that his business hosts called Art Seen. Its objective is to make art more accessible to everyone by exposing people to emerging artists whose works are affordable and fun to look at. The videos take the viewer on tours to galleries, studios and exhibitions of public art. Here's the link: https://www.youtube.com/user/nAscentArt/featured
Kathleen Treat	Ms. Treat, who was not present at the meeting, had a letter that she submitted read aloud on her behalf. She expressed her concern about the outdoor tables sought by Cara Mia restaurant covered in Agenda Item 21. She stated that the West 21st Street Block Association does not think that Cara Mia is a good operator. She believes that the outdoor tables would only add to the obstructions that exist in the area.
Lisa Wager	Ms. Wager is the Director of Government Relations at F.I.T. Praising the value of public education, she announced the award that was given to a recent graduate who received an associate's degree in interior design. He was awarded First Place in a national student design competition held by paint company Sherwin Williams. The \$2,500 prize was noted in the company's magazine – Stir.

Remarks from Elected Officials and Representatives

Eli Szenes-Strauss for Senator Brad Hoylman	<p>Following a recent report showing that bus service in the district is the lowest in the City – 4.7 miles per hour vs. 7 miles per hour across the City – the Senator sent a letter to State Comptroller Thomas P. DiNapoli requesting that he conduct an audit of NYC Transit bus wait times across the City. He noted in the letter that bus ridership fell 16% from 2002 to 2015 while subway ridership increased by 24.7%.</p> <p>The Senator and 24 legislators collaborated in a demand that the New York State Education Department change the simplistic metric that it uses to determine whether a particular school is “failing.” Currently, all transfer schools with a 6-year graduation rate of 67% are designated as failing schools. He considers this to be a disservice to the City's most</p>
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	vulnerable students and wants NYSED and the Board of Regents to evaluate transfer schools in a separate category that recognizes the high need nature of these students while also requiring accountability for academic standards.
Brennan Ward for Senator Marisol Alcantara	Mr. Ward mentioned several bills that the Senator sponsored or helped get passed that now await the Governor's signature. Among them are bills to: expand women-owned businesses; give a tax credit for increasing diversity in writing rooms; insure that lease riders specifically state which charges that may be increased; compel the health commissioner to issue warnings about lead contamination in high-risk areas; add at least one seat to the Cosmetology Board for a person who understands how to cut and style ethnic hair; respond to the findings of an asthma study conducted by the State; investigate the causes of teen suicide and to institute prevention measures; and, have media streaming services such as Netflix display emergency warnings on screen when issued.
Assembly Member Dick Gottfried	Mr. Gottfried talked about the current problems with the MTA, and noted that the main problem of keeping the system running is due to severe underfunding. While huge amounts have been allocated for the Second Avenue Subway, not enough funding has gone into maintenance and repair. He maintains that the argument put forth by the Governor about the City not paying its fair share is spurious, in that the City actually contributes <i>more</i> than its fair share while the State continues to pull money for the MTA out of its budget. He also believes that Suffolk and Nassau Counties should be contributing to the funding of the East Side Access Project.
Jeremy Crimm for Assembly Member Carolyn Maloney	Given the recent turmoil in Washington resulting from Congress's attempts to repeal the Affordable Care Act, Assembly Member Maloney wants everyone to know that she is continuing her efforts to protect the rights of all New Yorkers.
Council Member Helen Rosenthal	<p>Ms. Rosenthal noted that the City Budget, approved earlier this year, included a \$40 million increase in funding for social service providers to help defray costs of rent, homeless and senior services. She also noted the newly-enacted right to counsel that provides for free legal services to residents in Housing Court.</p> <p>The City Council also enacted legislation written by Council Member Rosenthal requiring the installation of Hearing Loop systems in City-funded capital projects with one or more public assembly areas. That technology consists of a wire that surrounds or crosses a room which transmits sound electromagnetically to telecoils in hearing aids and cochlear implants, eliminating background noise and providing a much clearer signal to the wearer. The system enhances accessibility and civic engagement for those who are hard of hearing.</p>
Jessica Silver for Comptroller Scott Stringer	<p>Over a two-week period in June, the Comptroller's staff conducted a survey of 1,227 subway riders in 143 stations during morning and evening commutes. The survey revealed that declining subway service has adversely affected the job security, family life, and healthcare of riders. Among respondents who were employed, subway delays caused 74% to be late for a work meeting, 18% to be reprimanded, and 13% to lose wages. An additional 22% were late for a job interview and 2% said they were fired.</p> <p>An investigation conducted this month revealed that the New York City Department of Education is missing more than 1,800 computers, laptops, and tablets, while more than 3,500 were not properly accounted for. In a sample of just eight schools and one agency office, the Comptroller found 35 percent of approximately 14,000 machines were not properly accounted for.</p>

Board Reports & Business

Adoption of Agenda and Minutes

The Agenda and June minutes were approved unanimously.

District Manager Report

Mr. Bodine provided highlights of events that he and Staff attended on behalf of the Board:

- The Resource Page on the CB4 website has been updated and reformatted. This was done primarily by summer intern Olivia Davis, who Mr. Bodine thanked for her hard work and dedication.
- As Manhattan Borough Coordinator for agency budget consultation process, Mr. Bodine worked with the 11 other Community Boards and constructed budget consultations question agendas for 19 different agencies.
- CB4 will be applying for a Planning Fellow to start in September. After much discussion with the chair and the Land use and Housing Co-Chairs it was agreed that the planner would continue to work on the Port Authority Bus Terminal redevelopment Project. As in the past, the planner will work under the supervision of the Clinton/Hell's Kitchen Land Use Committee and may coordinate with such stakeholder groups as the Hell's Kitchen South Coalition.

Mr. Bodine went on to note that the only committee meeting in August will be that of the BLP Committee, which will take place on the 8th at Yotel, 570 Tenth Avenue at 6:30 P.M.

Board Chair Report

Ms. Rubin directed everyone's attention to the posters at the back of the room which were placed there to gather input from the community for the annual City budget process. She also reminded Board members of the social event that would be held the next day at Hudson Boulevard Park at 6 P.M.

She then reviewed several meetings that Board members attended over the past month and a half:

- Members of the Garment District Task Force met to discuss ongoing issues in the district.
- Members of the Housing Committee met with Council Member Corey Johnson and Related Co. to discuss a resolution to the issues regarding the illegal demolition at 500 West 28th Street.
- Members of the Housing and Chelsea Land Use Committees met with the owners of 500 West 22nd Street regarding the improper demolition permits issued by DOB.
- Members met MTA representatives in ongoing discussions regarding the redevelopment of the Port Authority Bus Terminal.
